

City of Troy Recognized Once Again in “Safest City” Crime Rankings

CQ Press has released their “City Crime Rankings 2013: Crime in Metropolitan America:” (<http://www.cqpress.com/product/City-Crime-Rankings-2012-2013.html>). Troy is ranked as the third overall safest city in Michigan and 36th safest city overall in America. Making this designation more significant is Troy’s proximity to more dangerous areas.

CQ Press uses six crime categories to establish crime rate rankings for all cities with a population of at least 75,000 that report crime data to the FBI. The crime categories include: murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary and motor vehicle theft. The rankings in the CQ report are based upon data reported to the FBI for 2011.

According to the report, Troy has the 2nd lowest crime rate ranking in Michigan for cities with populations of 75,000 to 99,999 (third overall regardless of population size limits). Troy was

auto theft and larcenies from autos include:

- Installing a car alarm.

ranked as the safest city in Michigan 11 of the last 16 ranking periods. Troy has achieved “Safest City” rankings as high as 5th and 6th in the overall United States, in 2006 and 2005, respectively. In fact, in other than 2009, when it ranked 38th overall, Troy has consistently ranked among the top 25 safest cities in the United States with populations over 75,000 since 1998.

The crime categories used by CQ Press include all FBI Part 1 crimes, except larceny and arson. The FBI defines Part I crimes as the more serious crimes that occur in a community.

The number of Part 1 crimes reported to the Troy Police Department from 2000 through 2011 is:

Incidents of violent crime, which include murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, are extremely low. In 2011, there were only 64 violent crimes reported to the Troy Police Department, which

It should be noted that although 17 acts of criminal sexual conduct that occurred in Troy are classified as “rapes” in the FBI statistics, these types of assaults in Troy do not usually involve a victim being attacked by a stranger. There were no forcible rapes involving a stranger assaulting an unknown victim in 2011. Acts of criminal sexual conduct in Troy generally relate to incidents where one of the actors is a minor, complaints where incest or molestation by family members are alleged, or complaints of non-consensual acts between individuals who are acquainted with one another.

The Troy Police Department responded to a total of 35,018 incidents of all types in 2011. The Troy Dispatch center received approximately 173,000 incoming telephone calls in 2011, of which 40,335 were 911 calls. The department hosted 181 crime

and arrest individuals committing crimes, address traffic problems, and engage in other problem solving activities that enhance public safety. Often calls that are of a minor nature or are simply a request for a routine police report will find citizens waiting for what can be extended periods of time for a patrol officer to arrive due to the need to prioritize responses to more serious calls for service. Requiring citizens to come to the police department in person to file these types of reports can also result in the inconvenience of waiting in long lines. In the face of fewer officers on patrol, it is anticipated that the effective use of this system could potentially reduce overall response time associated with more serious incidents, as well as increase available time for officers on patrol to engage in proactive police work.

Generally, routine incidents and minor crimes cannot be assigned for investigation due to the need to use investigative resources for more serious offenses. Banks, insurance companies, and cell phone carriers still require a police report to respond to identity thefts, process claims, or intervene in situations of harassment involving cell phone technology. This system will provide citizens with that resource conveniently and online.
